

CHILD SAFEGUARDING CHECKLIST FOR ASSOCIATIONS AND CLUBS

This checklist can be used as a guide for Associations and Clubs wanting to ensure that they comply with the Child Safe Standards. It is important to remember that this is a guide and does not guarantee compliance.

Ensuring the safety of children in your association or club is an ongoing commitment. As part of this process, it is important to reflect on the culture you wish to instil in your association or club. Being a child safe organisation means championing child safety at all levels.

WE RECOMMEND YOU:

- 1. Complete this checklist yearly and review the resources you already have available to ensure they are up to date and comply with the latest Victorian Child Safe Standards and other legal and legislative requirements. Many of the required resources are available for use on the Basketball Victoria website.
- 2. Have Child Safety as a standing agenda item for all committee meetings. This will help to ensure that it is front of mind and becomes an important part of the culture and day to day running of your association or club.
- 3. Have a designated, appropriately trained Child Safety Officer at your association or club. Play by the Rules offers free MPIO and Child Safeguarding training/webinars. It is important that children and families know who the Child Safety Officer is and how they can contact them.
- 4. Have a position on your committee for a young person (young person in this instance may be anyone 25 years old or younger) and/or create a Youth Advisory Committee (YAC) if you don't already have one (Basketball Victoria's Child Safety Advisor can support you in this process).

6.	Are there resources available to children and their families that explain the ways in which you are welcoming and inclusive of all children and families? (including Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children, culturally and linguistically diverse children, children with a disability and LGBTQIA children and their families.)
